The Chapel at Killerton

This year has seen extensive conservation work on the chapel at Killerton. Built in 1841, the Chapel of the Holy Evangelists is Grade I listed and the most historically significant building on the Killerton estate. With its iconic stained glass rose window, it means so much to many.


In 1824 Sir Thomas Dyke Acland, 10th Baronet, consulted architect Charles Cockerell about the prospect of constructing a new private chapel to replace the existing two hundred year old chapel at Columbjohn. The chapel at Columbjohn was inconveniently situated (according to the family) and had 'gradually fallen into extensive decay, so as to make its rebuilding necessary for safety'. Two hundred years later, building works and interventive conservation are required to stabilise Sir Thomas' new replacement chapel.

So why does the chapel need such extensive repairs you may ask? The local Killerton volcanic stone, is both one of the building's great strengths but also an inherent weakness. The stone gives the Chapel of the Holy Evangelists a beautiful hue and a firm

link to the ground it stands upon, but it is incredibly friable meaning that the building is vulnerable to weathering. A newspaper report from 1848 indicates that the Teetotal Festival was unable to access the Chapel owing to repairs, hinting that the building may have faced problems from the very beginning.

The first phase of work included repairs and stabilisation to the stonework façade, using local Devon stone. It was always thought that it was the stone from the Clump that had been used but geologists believe that it was a quarry at Budlake that had been originally used. The stone from the Clump was used for repairs around thirty years ago and this has perished. Fresh stone has been sourced from a quarry near Crediton, Mid Devon, which is deemed to be the closest match. Repairs also included updates to the drainage system and restoration of the stained-glass windows.

During the specialist conservation work, the rose window was carefully removed, cleaned, the lead replaced and refitted - complete with intricatelyshaped divisions. With thanks to Holy Well Glass, a Somerset based company

who specialise in the conservation, restoration and design of stained glass; the window is now structurally sound. The colours of the glass are now once again vibrant and look spectacular when the sun shines through.

The work that has been completed so far is only possible because of the generous funding received from supporters. Further fundraising efforts have also included sales of a limited-edition pin badge. The badge has proved to be very popular as it was inspired by the much loved rose window and its colourful design.

Phase two of conservation work will continue into the new year and will address the interior fixtures and fittings including work on the organ, improving lighting levels, internal decoration and cleaning, and repairs to the 15th century interior wooden panelling. The Killerton team will also be improving the pathways and landscaping around the chapel grounds.

Do have a look at the chapel on your next visit to Killerton; we want to ensure that this magnificent building can continue to be enjoyed by everyone, for ever.

Chairman's Corner **Councillor Henry Massey**

It's been an unusually soggy few weeks in our Parish, with flooding the last month.

In Shercroft Close, a testament to community spirit was on full display as residents rallied in the face of rising floodwaters encroaching on their doorsteps and garages. The entire street came together, setting pumps to work and, crucially, sharing in the generous provision of tea and biscuits from the everresourceful Heidi. As another resident, Dave, commented to me, the whole experience exemplified the 'Best of British' in trying times.

I serve as one of the Broadclyst Ford flood admins (alongside Angie, our diligent Clerk), and for those of you who engage with our Facebook page,

you're part of a community several thousand strong. We receive flood alerts visiting several areas over from an automated system installed at the Cranny, which helps us keep the community up to date. When the waters rise dangerously high, we take the precaution of closing the road, signposting the closure clearly to prevent cars getting stuck and blocking the road for others when the waters drop. However, it's baffling and a bit of a concern when drivers decide to bypass these warnings, often finding themselves stranded as a result. Just last week, despite multiple signs, a vehicle ended up succumbing to the floodwater, a costly lesson in the risks of ignoring road closures. 'I only needed to get to Broadclyst' is a regular excuse I hear as a stranded motorist wades towards

me. Clearly, if the distance you are driving beyond the flood isn't far, the depth won't matter! 'I drive this way every day and it's usually fine' is another frequently uttered comment. I don't really know how to respond to that, but I hear it every time it floods.

It's also worth clarifying a common misconception: despite what many believe, our floods are not influenced by the tides. As a sailing instructor intimately familiar with the ebb and flow of the Exe Estuary, and with access to the Cranny brook monitoring data and accurate tide times, I can categorically state that rainfall is the true culprit behind our flooding.

On a brighter note, we're excited to announce that the old wooden walkway is having an upgrade. This



improvement will allow pedestrians and cyclists to safely navigate the area when the fords are impassable. It's also great that stranded drivers who ignore the signs, can climb on to the walkway from the flood water to get a better view of the result of their poor judgement.

And finally, as we look forward to the festive season, I extend my warmest wishes for a splendid Christmas to all. Fingers crossed, we'll be toasting to a picturesque snowy landscape rather than contending with more rainfall and floods!

Meet Buddy, Our Road Safety Bear!

Buddy is the mascot for Love Town Hill's safety initiative, supported by the Parish Council, to help make this residential area a safer, healthier and happier place.

Buddy will help teach children where the danger zones are and how to make Town Hill and nearby streets safer by encouraging drivers to park in accordance with the Highway Code, including not parking on junctions or the brow of a hill. The danger zone map opposite shows different zones for safer parking on and around Town Hill.

Buddy will be accompanied by a trained

helper gently reminding families about key road safety messages. Many of us grew up with Tufty the Squirrel and the Green Cross Code Man to help us understand the dangers of traffic, so we've introduced Buddy to help do the same. We hope Buddy will encourage children to take more care and educate drivers why it is dangerous to park on double yellow lines – they're there for a reason.

East Devon District Council is very supportive of this scheme, with advice and signposting help from Melody Trott, the council's Anti-Social Behaviour and Community Safety Partnership Co-ordinator.


Local neighbourhood police officers have now started visiting the area during the school run and are hoping to increase patrols next year.

- * The event is approved by the Victory Hall Committee, giving a minimum of eight weeks' notice.








2023 Campaign for Protect Rural England


This has been the first year Broadclyst Church has been entered for this competition run by the campaign to protect rural England.

At the Council Table

In the summer edition of the Broadsheet I wrote about how the Parish Council had resolved to object to the planning application for a BESS (Battery Energy Storage System) at Saundercroft Farm. Following a period of negotiation, the Council resolved that all negative impacts that could be mitigated have been so, especially those during delivery phase, as far as is reasonably practicable, so the objection has been lifted. The Parish met twice with the developers and at each meeting we achieved more in terms of mitigation of LGV movements and highways damage. You can see our 9th October response on the EDDC planning portal by entering 23/0962/ MFUL in the search box and go to page 10 of "Consultee Comments".

This is a very large installation; it can run at 300 megawatt (MW). Its storage capacity is 1,800 MW hours, so if it could be run down to empty, it could run at 300 MW for six hours. More recently another similar application has come forward, just

across the hedge from our Parish, on the road to Poltimore, and in Poltimore parish. This proposal is not so big, at 57 MW. Once again, the proposal is to connect directly into the Exeter Sub-station on the Broadclyst - Whimple road. Should the Poltimore BESS go ahead, it would necessitate the laying of underground cables between the site and during two of the winter the sub-station, probably along the B3181, through Dog Village and along Whimple Road.

It was recently a great pleasure to inspect the allotments of Broadclyst Allotment Association. Well done to Paul and everyone who helps! The long-awaited occupation of the Hillside Gardens allotments at Westclyst draws nearer, having been delayed by unforeseen issues (badgers...) and legalities of land ownership that has impacted the lease. We are getting there!

I am delighted that the project to replace the rotten raised walkway at the Broadclyst Fords

(between Broadclyst Station and Wishford Farm) is underway as I write this. Funded by Devon County Council, the replacement raised walkway uses a new nonslip material made from recycled plastic which is extremely hard wearing, harmless to the environment, and will not rot like wood. The walkway was installed far, Babet and Ciarán, both for additional community of which caused the Cranny brook to burst its banks and cover much of its flood plain.

The Parish Council has recently replaced the telemetry gauge as the original one was almost ten years old, with failing casing that caused the unit to malfunction. The telemetry gauge detects changes in the river level and sends text alerts to Angie and Henry Massey as it rises, thus enabling them to respond and monitor the river level for potential flooding. Apparently, it usually goes list off in the middle of the night...!

Bad weather puts an additional strain on council resources as council staff, councillors, and community volunteers respond to weather-related issues across the Parish. The Parish Council secured external grant storms we have suffered so funding of just over £1,300 resilience equipment, which has already proven to be very useful!



Christmas Pudding Ice Cream

100g (4oz) mixed no-soak dried fruit 60ml (4 tbsp) light or dark rum 30ml (2 tbsp) port grated rind and juice of 1 orange 450ml (15 fl oz) fresh single cream 3 egg yolks 100g (4oz) caster sugar 150ml (5 fl oz) fresh whipping cream 5 ml (1 tbsp) ground mixed spice

To microwave

RECIPE SPRINKLES SUGAR

Complete step 1. Beat the cream in a medium bowl and cook on HIGH for 5 minutes. Complete step 3. Strain into a large bowl and cook on MEDIUM for 7-8 minutes, whisking frequently. Cool, then complete steps 5-9

- 1. Mix dried fruit, rum, port, orange rind and juice then set aside to marinate overnight.
- 2. Gently heat single cream in a small saucepan to simmering point.
- 3. Whisk egg yolks and sugar in a medium bowl until pale and thick. Gradually pour on the hot cream, stirring continuously.
- 4. Strain mixture into a heavy-based or double saucepan and cook over a gentle heat, stirring continuously until it coats the back of a wooden spoon. (about 20 mins) Do not boil. Set aside to cool.
- 5. Whip the cream until stiff then fold into the cold custard with the dried fruit mixture and mixed spice.
- 6. Pour into a shallow freezer container, cover and freeze for about 3 hours until mushy.
- 7. Turn into a chilled bowl and beat well. Return to the freezer container and freeze for a further 2 hours.
- 8. Beat the mixture again, then turn into a 1.1 litre (2 pint) bombe mould, cover and freeze for a further 2 hours till firm.
- 9. Transfer to the refrigerator to soften for 30 minutes before serving. Turn out on to cold plate.
